Please submit the following items to the Admissions Office

1. A completed HCTC admissions application.

4. ACT scores, if available. If you have not taken the ACT or you did not receive an *18 or higher* in Writing, Reading, and/or Mathematics sections, you must take the COMPASS placement test, which is given at HCTC.

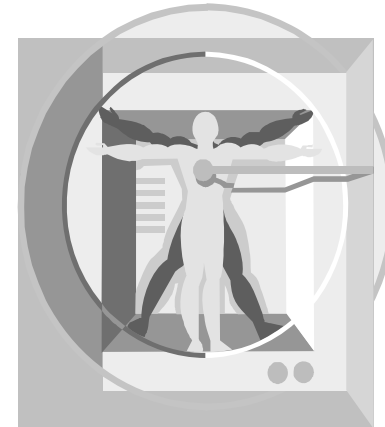

What is *Human Services?*

Human Services focuses on improving or maintaining the physical and mental health and general well-being of individuals, groups, or communities in our society.

“Human Services” is a broad term that overlaps with the terms “social welfare” and “social work”. This program was developed in response to the need of individuals or groups for assistance to live better lives.

What are the requirements *for Admission?*

Currently, admission to the Human Services Program is open to any student who is interested in helping people. Classes are offered every semester on each of the four Hazard Community & Technical College Sites (Hazard, Knott County Branch, Lees College Campus, and Leslie County Center) to accommodate both day and evening students.

Will I receive a *College Degree?*

YES! Students graduate with an Associate in Applied Science Degree. The classes will transfer to regional colleges and universities. Students can continue their studies toward a Social Work or Human Service Bachelor degree (a four-year college degree) with the University Center of the Mountains.

What is the *Clinical?*

Students are required to take HS 250, the Clinical, as the final class in the Human Services sequence. This course combines theory and practical experience in an agency setting which is selected based on student's interest and the opportunities available in their home community. Students must work 15 hours each week under the supervision of a professional for 12 weeks.

Are jobs available with an *Associate Degree?*

YES! Graduates can work at Kentucky River Community Care, Children's Centers, Foster Care Programs, Nursing Homes, Community Ministries, Head Start, Family Resource Centers/Youth Service Centers, Office of Employment and Training, Cabinet for Health and Family Services, Public Housing Alliance, Public Health Department Services, Human Resources Personnel Offices, Corrections, and numerous other agencies available in this region.
